CAMP



Boys are drawn to Scouting because of the promise of Outdoor Adventure. Programs are offered throughout the year for Cub Scouts and Boy Scouts in order to help the boys learn about the natural world, advance in rank, and to build friendships that will last a lifetime. No boy is denied an opportunity to attend a Chickasaw Council camping event due to financial hardship.

In the summer of 2011, **Kia Kima** hosted more than 130 Cub Scout and Boy Scout Units including over 2,400 participants in it's Summer Camp Program. Of these units, 36 were from other Councils traveling sometimes more than nine hours to attend our summer program. The States these units represented included Arkansas, Illinois, Louisiana, Mississippi, Missouri, Texas and Nebraska.

During the fall season of 2011, nearly 3,000 Scouts, their families and volunteers camped at either **Akela Cub Weekend** for Cub Scouts or the **Scout Expo** for Boy Scouts. Both weekends offered boys opportunities to advance in rank, learn outdoor skills and enjoy the freedom of nature.

The **9th Annual Winter Camp** was held between the Christmas and New Year's holiday at Kia Kima Scout Reservation. A team of more than 50 volunteers was assembled to offer over 40 Merit Badges to Scouts. More than 350 participants tested their cold weather camping skills to enjoy the many opportunities that our camping facility has to offer in winter.



TRAINING



Leadership Training for Today's Youth--Over 38 Boy Scouts were trained as leaders in a week long intensive course at Kia Kima Scout Reservation.

The National Advanced Youth Leadership Experience (N.A.Y.L.E.) was designed with input from some of the leading experts in corporate and military leadership, youth education, and Scouting programs. Six Chickasaw Council Scouts travelled to St. Louis, MO for this pinnacle in youth training.

University of Scouting is the largest training event held by the Chickasaw Council. More than 250 Adult Volunteers, Scouts and Staff participated in 2011. Programs ranged from Executive Board Orientation and Leader Specific Training to Outdoor Cooking and Primitive Fire Building.

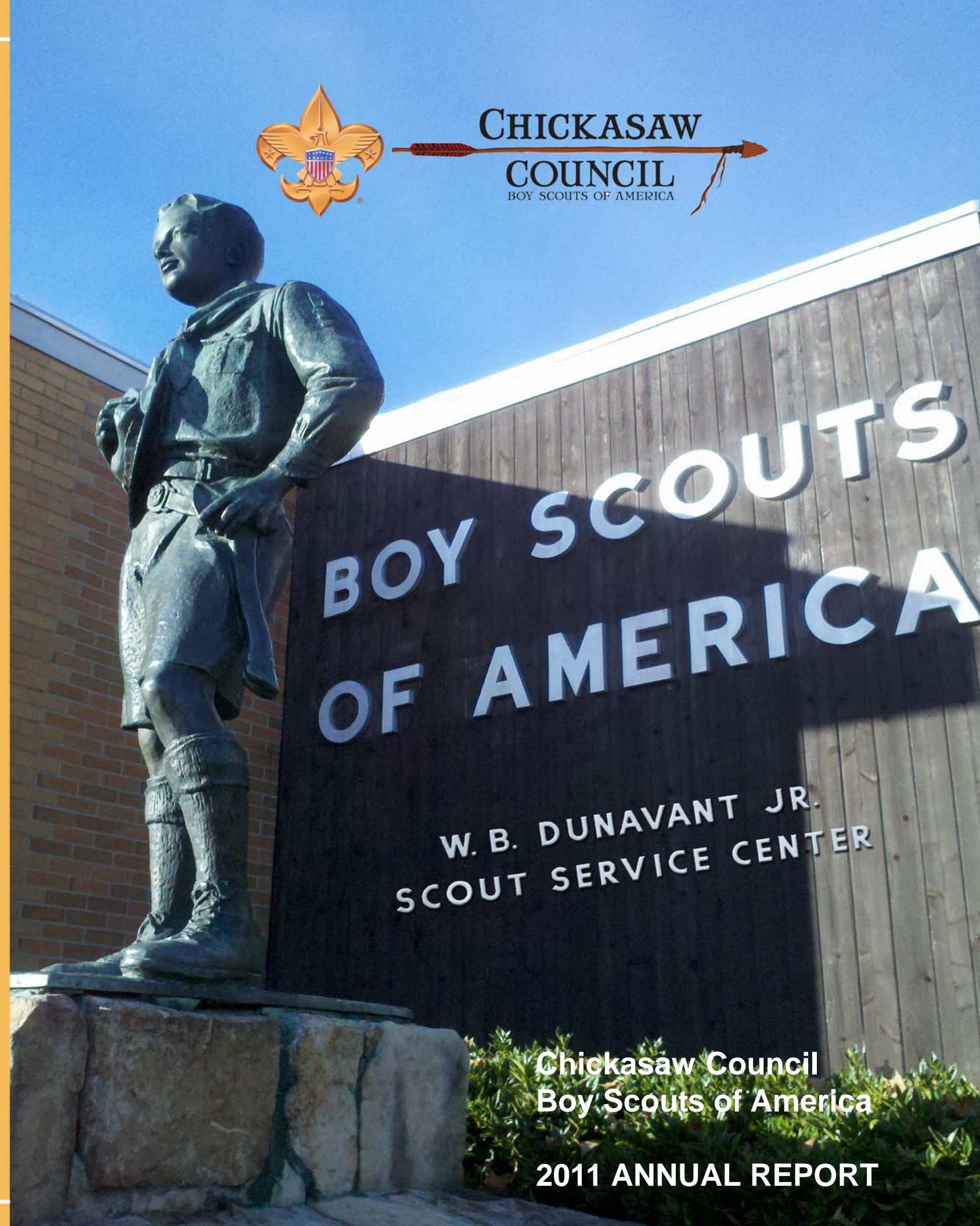
